Below are notes – some more extensive than others, that highlight key bills that are more relevant to EMSWCD given the kind of land here and issues/concerns we are working on in this region that you may want to consider/discuss at the upcoming work session.

If the board decides to either support or oppose any bills, there are three ways you can voice your position:

- Written Testimony (I can send a draft for review. I recommend you assign one person on the board to approve any written testimony – perhaps Mike Guebert since he sits on the OACD Advocacy Committee).
- 2. In-person Testimony I can track when and where the bill will be heard (which committee) and reach out to the bill sponsor as well as OACD for details and special instructions, if applicable.
- 3. Add EMSWCD name to list of those who either support or oppose. No testimony needed.

#### Senate Bills of note:

**SB 398/HB 2197** Requires State Department of Agriculture to study confined animal feeding operations (CAFO).

Mike Guebert is tracking. Impacts raw milk – OACD is considering opposition because it could represent regulatory over-reach

SB 530 – support - supports the viability of Oregon's forest owners, farmers, and ranchers by investing in natural climate solutions (NCS). \*See details about SB 530 below

**SB 775** – Support - Will be introduced in Rules Committee – changes eligibility framework for running for a SWCD board seat.

Small group of SWCD's has been meeting on this issue after OACD chose to stay neutral on this possible legislation. They will be meeting with Sen. Frederick. Will recommend keeping zone representation across the state, supports the 100k population cut-off, which would impact 10 districts in the state, including EMSWCD.

**SB 580** – Support? - Requires Land Conservation and Development Commission to amend statewide planning goals to address equity, engagement with underserved populations and climate change.

## **House Bills of note:**

**HB 2164 & 2165** – OACD likely to oppose - Directs State Fish and Wildlife Commission to waive requirement for fish passage under certain circumstances.

**HB 2236** – oppose? Prohibits Governor and specified state agencies from taking measures to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in Oregon unless authorized by Legislative Assembly.

**HB 2737** - Support? - Allows agencies to sell, lease or donate state real property of agency to eligible Indian tribes notwithstanding ordinary transfer procedures.

**HB 2989 & 3181** – renewable energy siting that protects high value farm & ranch lands. Will be gutted & stuffed but intended to protects natural resources; Committee being established for planning what land might be eligible for dual purpose.

HB 2998 – support - soil health initiative \$2M through OWEB — this bill will have received a hearing on 2/16 – so may be more information by the time the work session takes place.

Creates Oregon Soil Health Initiative. Directs Institute for Natural Resources to convene Soil Health Advisory Committee. Directs institute, in consultation with other entities, to develop Soil Health Roadmap

**HB 3016** – Support? - Establishes Community Green Infrastructure Grant Program. Could be helpful with our urban-focused built environment efforts (ala MHCC, etc.) (VERDE supports)

**HB 3021** – Establishes that perfected and developed water right is not subject to forfeiture if owner of water right ceased to use all or part of water appropriated for period of five successive years because owner engaged in water conservation practices or distribution of water that owner received from water district was less than certificated maximum for period of at least five successive years. *encourage water conservation w/out putting water rights at risk.* 

**HB 3103** – Support - funding for OSU water management tech assistance

#### NOTE:

In addition to bills being introduced, OACD is also supporting a \$10 million ask for OAHP for conservation easements and ag practices leading to carbon sequestration – that is not a bill, but an ask in support of OWEB's budget.

**This session, support Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) POPs 215 and 115**: \$10 million for grants & \$800,000 for program administration for OAHP.

## **Background information on select bills:**

# \*HB 2998 Oregon Soil Health Initiative – background information Why a Healthy Soils Bill?

Oregon's farms and ranchers are increasingly impacted by extreme weather events including drought, fire, extreme heat and flooding, all while struggling with narrow profit margins.

Healthy soils provide many benefits for farms and ranches, including:

- economic resilience and increased profitability
- resilience to drought and other extreme weather events

- improved water and nutrient-holding capacity, reduced erosion, enhanced plant health (including disease and pest resistance)
- reduced agricultural input costs and protection of worker health
- sequestered carbon, improved water quality, and increased biodiversity and pollinator habitat

#### What is the Oregon Soil Health Initiative?

The Healthy Soils Bill will establish the Oregon Soil Health Initiative to leverage existing programs and expand resources to support farmers and ranchers with soil health practices that make the most sense for their land and businesses. The Bill is a *voluntary, incentive-based approach* that is focused on expanding strategies to advance soil health including: technical assistance, outreach and farmer-to-farmer education, financial incentives, and research. The Institute for Natural Resources will coordinate the following collaborating entities: Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, Oregon State University (Extension and College of Ag), Department of Agriculture, and Soil and Water Conservation Districts. *It's a comprehensive initiative to promote soil health on Oregon's farms and ranches*.

The Healthy Soils Bill has already garnered bi-partisan bicameral support in the Legislature. Establishing the Oregon Soil Health Initiative will coordinate new and existing efforts to support producers to maintain and improve soil health. HB 2998 will position Oregon to receive more federal funding by providing matching funds and creating a roadmap for the future of soil health.

## What soil health practices will the Initiative promote?

Whether growing fruit in Hood River or raising beef cattle in Eastern Oregon, there are soil health practices that fit every farm and ranch. The bill defines "soil health practice" as an agricultural practice consistent with the following soil health principles: keep the soil covered, maintain the presence of living roots, enhance biodiversity and limit disturbances. Soil health practices that align with these principles include:

- reduced tillage and no till
- cover cropping
- crop rotation
- rotational grazing
- application of compost and other organic amendments
- mulching
- integrated pest and nutrient management
- hedgerow and riparian plantings
- other agroforestry practices, such as silvopasture and alley cropping

#### SB 530 - background information

This bill will:

- Define natural and working lands (NWL) and establish policy direction to advance NCS.
- Provide dedicated funding for voluntary NCS projects, positioning the state to leverage significant new federal funding and private investments.
- Fund and direct state agencies to provide incentives and technical support to forest owners, farmers, and ranchers to implement NCS on NWL.
- Invest in a comprehensive Oregon NWL inventory and workforce analysis to monitor our progress and prioritize future investments.

The same practices that sequester and store carbon contribute co-benefits that support farmers, ranchers, forest owners, and entire communities.

• Healthy soils produce healthier crops, retain more moisture, and improve water quality, while increasing

the producer's net earnings over time.

- Healthy forests provide clean drinking water, habitat for fish and wildlife, and protection from wildfire.
- Healthy coastal wetlands sequester carbon as they filter water, provide critical habitat, and protect communities from storm surges.

SB 530 advances the strategies identified in the Natural and Working Lands Proposal, adopted by the Oregon Global Warming Commission in 2021 after extensive stakeholder engagement. A broad coalition of Oregon farmers, ranchers, forest owners, and environmental and climate organizations support this bill.

## Natural climate solutions build on Oregon's emissions goals

The Oregon Global Warming Commission found that natural climate solutions can sequester at least an additional 5 MMTCO2e per year in Oregon's natural and working lands and waters by 2030, and at least 9.5 MMTCO2e per year by 2050.

#### What are natural climate solutions?

Natural climate solutions are activities that protect or enhance the ability of natural and working lands to sequester and store carbon or reduce greenhouse gas emissions while maintaining or increasing climate resilience, human well-being, and biodiversity. They can protect Oregon communities and natural resource economies from climate-fueled droughts, wildfires, and unprecedented heat.

Legislature's definition of climate resiliency: the capability to anticipate, prepare for, respond to and recover from significant climate-related threats with minimum damage to social well-being, the economy and the environment.

#### Natural Climate Solutions include:

- 1. Planting more trees in urban areas;
- 2. Protecting and recovering watersheds and wetlands;
- 3. Planting cover crops on agricultural lands;
- 4. Lengthened logging rotations on private lands;
- 5. Protecting mature and old-growth forests on public lands; and
- 6. Protecting coastal communities from storm surge and flooding.
